COMMENTS FROM THE MAYOR

This winter the Village Department of Public Works staff has again taken care of the snow removal from the Village streets. It has been a busier year than last year and we have already used nearly 1000 tons of salt. Our equipment has performed well and from the comments I hear from the public our roadways have been well maintained.

As you may have noticed, we are constructing a new garage facility for all of our equipment. The construction is nearly finished and it will be a great benefit to John and his staff to get into clean warm trucks to begin the snow plowing next season. The construction has made their job a bit more of a challenge this season especially parking our large trucks while leaving access for the construction crew.

We will be busy as soon as the weather warms and dries a bit repairing the usual winter damage to the roadways. Pot holes will continue to be patched as soon as we hear about them and more permanent repairs will be carried out as soon as the asphalt batch plants re-open in the spring. Crack sealing and shoulder repairs along with street sweeping and re-striping will be carried out as soon as weather permits. The other rite of spring is the annual brush pickup by Town of Lansing and Village crews. The dates of the pickup and the guidelines appear later in the newsletter and I hope you will take advantage of this opportunity.

The new district, the Warren Road Sewer District, has now been approved and construction is nearly complete. We have negotiated the final agreements with the Town. It will be a modest system that at most will amount to 120 units (~ 40,000 gallons per day) and can easily be accommodated by our transmission system. It continues the spirit of cooperation between the Town and the Village.

We have completed the budget process for the coming fiscal year and have a proposed budget that will be presented at a public hearing scheduled for 7:35 pm on April 7. The assessed value of the properties in the Village has decreased by 2% compared to last year, so with a tax rate of \$1.21, an increase of 2% over last year leaves the tax levy the same as last year. This is less that inflation (2.5% for the items we use) this past year and is significantly less than other taxing entities in the region and has been made possible through careful management. We expect that next year we will remain in this steady state with the tax levy increasing at roughly the rate of inflation since the costs of the Village's needed supplies increase with inflation just like those required by you and me. Over the years, the Village has systematically reduced it reliance on New York State financial aid so that budget issues in Albany have only minor effects on Village finances.

During this coming construction season, we will be replacing around 900 feet of sanitary sewer main behind the Shops at Ithaca Mall to improve capacity to accommodate anticipated growth in the Northeastern part of the Village. In addition we will be replacing a section of water main along Cayuga Heights Road that has had a number of breaks during the past few years along with replacing the water main along Burdick Hill Road. The other water related project will be the demolition of the Oakcrest Tank which is no longer in service. This is part of a project to construct a new Village Office that will be started this year and completed next year. The storm water sewer along Dart Drive that was started last year will be completed this year and a sidewalk will be constructed along the north side of the roadway. The roadway will also be repaved as part of this project. In addition, there will be other small repaving projects in the Village. These projects are all part of our long-range infrastructure maintenance program. By carrying out these projects in a planned way, we avoid the serious failures that are very expensive to repair when they occur.

This past year, Larry Fresinski retired as Trustee and Deputy Mayor to join his family in Las Vegas. Larry served the Village tirelessly since the spring of 1993 and was responsible for creating our website and taking care of our software challenges. We will miss him. Jodi has taken over maintenance of the website and that is going well. Pat O'Rourke agreed to serve as Trustee to replace Larry and is overseeing our youth programs. With her background in youth activities and support she is a very welcome addition to the Board. It is this kind of dedication that makes the Village of Lansing such a delightful place to live and work.

Finally, Village elections for Mayor and two Trustees will be held from noon to 9 pm on Tuesday April 26th at the Village Office. I encourage you to vote.

LOOK FOR THE PINK POSTCARD!

In April your water/sewer bill will be a postcard. The Southern Cayuga Intermunicipal Water Commission (SCLIWC) met with representatives from each municipality to find a more cost efficient way to send out bills. The previous bills were carbon copies and were hard to read so they have gone back to postcards. Postcards are also cheaper to mail. However, the dot matrix printer they are currently using to print the post cards is also hard to read. SCLIWC is working on replacing that printer. Hopefully, this problem will be resolved before you receive your July billing. If you are having trouble reading your bill please call the office and Jodi will get you the correct information. Thank you for bearing with us through this transition.

WHEN IS IT DUE?

Many people call the office to find out when payments are due. If you have water and sewer services you receive a bill quarterly at the beginning of January, April, July and October. All water/sewer bills are due by the 20th of that month and can be either mailed in or you may bring your payment to the Village Office at 2405 N. Triphammer Rd. The Village of Lansing is part of the Southern Cayuga Lake Intermunicipal Water Commission (SCLIWC).

Village Tax Bills will be going out June 1st and will be due by July 1st. We do accept postmark. Any payments that are made after July 1st but before July 31st have a five-percent penalty. There is an additional one percent penalty added each additional month that the payment is late. In November the unpaid taxes are turned over to Tompkins County and relevied on your Town & County Tax Bill.

BRUSH PICK-UP

Spring brush and limb pick-up will be provided by the Village of Lansing Highway Department on May 9th. Residents are asked to leave all materials near the roadside by 6:00am Monday morning. To assist the work crews, all limbs and brush (up to 5 inches in diameter) should be piled with the cut ends facing the same direction. The limbs should be no longer than 6 feet in length. Also, the piles should not be

tied, but should be left loose. Please do not put out bags of yard waste. This pick up is only for limbs and brush.

You may also take your brush to the Town of Lansing Highway Department any time during the year. They also have a large pile of free woodchips that any Lansing Resident is allowed to go pick up for their personal use. Sorry, no private contractors! PLANNING BOARD NEWS

Since our last Planning Board News we are pleased to welcome Jonathan Kanter as our Alternate Board member. Jonathan brings with him 32 years of planning experience, having just retired from the Town of Ithaca as Director of the Planning Department. The Alternate member position was being temporarily filled by Ned Hickey. Once again, our thanks to Ned for 25 years of dedicated service to the Village.

In the interest of maintaining the aesthetics of the Village, the Planning Board and the Village Code Officer reviewed and updated several sign laws, which were approved by the Board of Trustees. The purpose of these changes are threefold: i) provide adequate size for readability by passing traffic, ii) permit equitable, yet controlled and minimal commercialized advertising, and iii) provide necessary and helpful way-finding directional signs; while at all times keeping signage throughout the Village as unobtrusive as possible.

We earlier reported on a major project, just west and north of the YMCA, that would have resulted in the construction of a BJ's Wholesale Club, 12 single-family Senior Housing units, and a wetlands/bird habitat. It is now public knowledge that the IDA rejected the developer's application to fund the Senior Housing units. While awaiting word from the Triax developers we have insured that land fronting on Oakcrest Rd.will now be residential, as a result of the Planned Development Area (PDA) that the Village Boards (Planning and Trustees) established.

We welcome the new CIAO! Restaurant on Triphammer Rd., which opened in November.

A proposal for development of 65 affordable housing townhouse rental units has recently been submitted. The location is a 23-acre parcel of land between Woodthrush Hollow Lane and Dart Drive. This project is still in the very early stages of what is generally a quite lengthy process. As of this publication the developers have not heard whether their application for the NYS grant monies has been approved, which would partially fund this project.

Once again, we welcome the Village public to attend our Planning Board meetings, which usually are held the second Monday and the last Tuesday of each month, from 7:30 - 10:00pm.
