COMMENTS FROM THE MAYOR

Our summer construction season is winding down with over a mile of roadway resurfaced. The construction of the connector road in Lansing Trails is nearly complete and will be finished before the end of the month. The south side of Dart Drive storm water drainage system is now complete and the south side now has a bike lane/walkway like the north side making it much safer for biking and walking.





The landscaping around the new Village Office is making good progress with most of the plantings installed and the grass is finally starting to grow. We will be installing a new sign for meetings, etc. in

the next few months to complete the construction project. The old village office is going to become our records storage area so that all of these materials can be consolidated into one location.

The design for the new traffic signal at the intersection of North Triphammer Road and Craft Road is complete and right of way/construction easements are nearly finished. There is a six week construction time for the steel poles and we are hoping that the necessary paving can be done before asphalt plants close for the season. This would enable finishing the project before the end of the year.

S.C.L.I.W.C. has sent a proposed agreement to the five municipal members to change the water rate schedule for 2015. The rate that the Commission is proposing is a 6.7% increase from \$4.08 to \$4.35 per 1,000 gallons, subject to approval by all five member municipalities. In addition to the rate that the Commission sets, the Village of Lansing also has a surcharge that is added to maintain our portion of the water system. Currently, that surcharge is 25%. With the 25% surcharge the total water rate will be \$5.43 per 1,000 gallons.

The Village Board was expecting an increase closer to the rate of inflation and at their September 15th meeting tabled the decision until they could get an explanation of why it is a 6.7% increase. The Board revisited this issue on October 6th and approved the increase. If you are interested in the explanation of the increase it can be found on Bolton Point's webpage. Village residents will see this increase in their April 2015 bill.

One of the rites of fall is the brush pickup that is mentioned later in this newsletter. Be sure to take advantage of this to get rid of all those cuttings that have accumulated over the summer.

Finally, please be sure to vote on November 4.

PLANNING BOARD NEWS

You may have noticed a few previously approved projects are in the process of being done: the Village Office building landscaping plan, the Gastroenterology/CMC building on the corner of Triphammer and Craft Roads, and the second Dairy One building on Warren Road. OK, I will say it for us, "I can't wait until they are done!"

The Al-Huda Islamic Center of Finger Lakes submitted a special permit application to construct an approximate 4,800 sq. ft. Religious Facility building on the empty lot at 112 Graham Rd. This meets all of the Village codes for land use. During the Public Hearing the Planning Board did the usual thorough review for any environmental impacts; including building heights, on-property parking requirements, stormwater management practices, and any additional traffic impact. We approved the request after determining all necessary conditions have been, or will be, met. A few neighbors' traffic and parking concerns will be monitored. Prior to building, a landscaping plan will be submitted to the Planning Board.

A special permit for an approximate 2,860 sq. ft. addition to the Bin-Optics existing building at 9 Brown Rd. has been approved. A few established trees will need to be removed, and replaced. But, for the most part, this expansion will incur minimal environmental impact.

A special permit proposal for a home occupation hair salon was denied, due to increased traffic safety issues and other environmental impacts in the Shannon Park neighborhood.

Other activities approved by the Planning Board with minor environmental impacts:

- -Permit for a temporary outdoor used car sale at Cayuga Mall.
- -Permit for temporary outdoor storage bins for Target store at Shops at Ithaca Mall.
- -Permit to allow a farmer's market every Friday, May thru Nov, at the Triphammer Marketplace.
- -Permit to allow Sprint to co-locate wireless equipment on the existing cellular tower behind the Cayuga Mall.

We wish to thank all those residents who listened to our request (in the Spring Village Newsletter) to help prevent shopping carts from leaving the retail areas and being abandoned in other areas of the village (especially the residential neighborhoods). Please continue the efforts to eliminate these hazards to children, walkers, and vehicular traffic. Thank you.

Welcome to John Gillott as the new alternate member for the Planning Board. John is a long-time resident of the Village, living on Brook Way. Prior to retirement John was Chief Operating Officer for Ongweoweh Corp. on Warren Rd. At the same time, Deborah Dawson moved up from alternate to regular Planning Board member.

Once again, we welcome the Village public to attend our Planning Board meetings, which usually are held the second Monday and the last Tuesday of each month at 7pm.

Brush Pick-Up

Fall brush and limb pick-up will be provided by the Village of Lansing Highway Department on Monday, October 13th. Residents are asked to leave up to one pick-up truck size load near the roadside by 7:00 am. To assist the work crews, all limbs and brush (up to 5 inches in diameter) should be piled with the cut ends facing the same direction. The limbs should be no longer than 6 feet in length. Also, the piles should not be tied, but should be left loose. Please do not put out bags of yard waste. This pick up is only for limbs and brush. Residents, not contractors, may also take brush to the Town of Lansing Highway Department, located at 10 Town Barn Road, any time during the year.

Did you know you can enter your water reading on-line? The process is simple, easy and not only saves you time, but it also saves postage. Go to **www.boltonpoint.org** or you can call 607-277-0660 anytime. Updates can also be made to a phone number or e-mail address on your water/sewer account.

Water Bills are mailed out quarterly on the 1st and are due by the 20th. (January, April, July, October) If you know you will be out of town when your water bill comes you may pay in advance. A credit will show on your account and this will help to avoid late fees. If you have any questions about payments please call the Village of Lansing at 257-0424 ext. #2. Bolton Point creates the water/sewer bills but payments are made to the Village of Lansing.

The Village Clerk/Treasurer understands that life gets in the way and occasionally we forget to pay our bill. If this happens you may come to a Board of Trustees meeting and ask to have your late fee waived. The Board is the only one authorized to waive late fees. If you plan to attend a Board meeting for this reason please contact Jodi at the Village Office.

Village of Lansing Possible Site for Scrap Recycling Drop Spot

Tompkins County Solid Waste (TCSW) in partnership with the Village of Lansing seeks to site a food scrap recycling drop spot in Lansing, to expand food scrap recycling options for residents. If final details get worked out, the new drop spot will operate in the parking area behind the old Village Office every Saturday beginning October 25, 2014. Hours of operation will be from 10 am to 1:00 pm, with staffing from 9:30am to 1:30pm for set-up and tear-down. In November, the drop spot will be reevaluated to affirm winter hours. Staffing for the site is to be determined and will likely include two paid staff – one Drop Spot Coordinator and a Drop Spot Attendant. TCSW will provide staff training to ensure a consistent message across all drop spots.

If you know anyone interested in being a Drop Spot Attendant please contact Kat McCarthy at TWSW (273-6632). A Drop Spot Attendant would be responsible for the safe flow of vehicles and pedestrians on site. In order to ensure quality customer service, the attendant may be asked to provide outreach materials and information regarding food scraps recycling. Specific areas of accountability include productivity, safety, and smooth operation of the receiving and unloading process. There is a more complete job description available in the Village Office if you are interested or contact Kat.

Cayuga Compost will be providing data on the weight of food scraps recycled per collection. TCSW will provide outreach materials to be used at the site, and will promote the program through social media and communication efforts to target users in the village and town. Kick-off promotion will occur in advance of the first collection day, and will include reaching out to the Town, Village, and Rotary club, as well as tabling at a local grocery store.

VILLAGE DEER MANAGEMENT PROGRAM

For the past 7 years, the Village of Lansing (VOL) Board of Trustees has annually approved a coordinated bow hunting program to reduce the size of the deer herd in the Village. Concerns by residents about Lyme disease, deer vehicle collisions, ecological damage (no forest regeneration) and damage to ornamental plantings prompted the initiation of this program in 2007. The number of participating landowners has steadily increased and now well over 30 landowners participate in the program.

For the past 7 years, the VOL has followed state rules about discharge distances and hunting seasons. Three years ago, the state established a Deer Management Focus Area (DMFA) in an area surrounding the Cornell campus. All properties in the VOL fall within the designated area. The DMFA was established to increase deer take by allowing hunters to take two antlerless deer per day and by establishing a 3-week winter hunting season during the last 3 weeks in January. 2014 is the third year that these regulations are in place and the success of this approach is being evaluated by the DEC.

Most importantly, the state, through an act of the legislature signed by Governor Cuomo into law in early spring 2014, has changed the discharge distance rules for bow and cross bow users. While previously discharge was prohibited within 500 feet of an occupied dwelling (unless occupants wave this restriction), the new rules now establish the discharge distance as 150 feet for bows, and 250 feet for crossbows, but retain the 500 feet for guns. The VOL Board of Trustees has recently adopted these new state rules for the coordinated bow hunting in the VOL, but only bows are legal hunting implements in the VOL at the present time (no cross bows or guns are allowed). This rule change will allow use of areas on approved properties previously off limits due to discharge distance requirements.

The deer take in the VOL has been about 50-70 animals per year in the last few seasons. This has been accomplished with 10-20 approved responsible and dedicated hunters each season. We have conducted these operations safely and without incidents and all venison has been donated for human consumption. Deer numbers, according to reports by residents and the number of reported deer-vehicle collisions, are greatly reduced. We are monitoring the ecological success as well, but it appears that more efforts need to be expanded to further reduce the deer numbers in the Village to address Lyme disease concerns and ecological damage. New research conducted for over a decade in Connecticut, has established a clear link between deer numbers, tick numbers, Lyme disease incidence in ticks, and the reported Lyme disease in residents. A culling program reducing the deer herd to 5-8 animals per square kilometer reduced tick numbers by 80%, Lyme disease incidence in ticks by 80% and the incidence of Lyme disease in residents by 80%. The long suspected effect of mice, other rodents and small mammals was of no importance and the core feature was low deer abundance – nothing else mattered. Similar work has been done in Indiana.

There is a long ways to go to achieve these numbers in the VOL. But with efforts by surrounding communities and at Cornell University, we may have a chance of succeeding in the VOL as well. If you are interested to obtain more information about the VOL bow hunting program or want to become a participating landowner, please contact the Village Clerk and we will get in touch with you to discuss opportunities.

We are guests in the Village, each landowner retains full control over any activity on their properties and we operate with a very limited number of hunters that are all interviewed and approved before becoming eligible. But it is also important to recognize that all properties and hunters have to be approved by the Board of Trustees, and the hunting coordinators. You cannot approve individuals to

hunt on your own property who are not part of the coordinated bow hunting program. Ask the Village Clerk for clarifications should you have any questions. You will be asked to sign some paperwork. We have greatly curtailed illegal use of properties by unethical hunters wanting to take advantage of the large deer numbers and secluded woodlots in the VOL. If you have any questions whether an individual is part of the VOL program if someone knocks on your door to ask for permission to hunt, contact the Village Clerk. If that person does not hand you a piece of paper to sign if your land is targeted for hunting or deer retrieval, please be suspicious, ask for contact information, and ask for confirmation from the Village Clerk. The 2014-15 hunting season dates are as follows: October 1st to December 16th 2014, and January 10th to January 31st 2015.

TAX FREEZE

You may of hear of the Tax Freeze and wonder what it is all about. Governor Cuomo and the State Legislature enacted the Property Tax Freeze Credit as part of the 2014-2015 State Budget. The law provides a Freeze Credit to qualified homeowners. To qualify, a homeowner must be eligible for the School Tax Relief (STAR) property tax exemption. Commercial properties are not eligible. For the Village to qualify we would have to limit any increase in our tax levy to a property tax cap set by State law and develop and implement a Government Efficiency Plan determined to be compliant by the New York State Division of Budget.

The new law encourages local governments and school districts to generate long-term tax relief for New York State taxpayers sharing services; consolidating or merging; and demonstrating and implementing operational efficiencies. One of the problems is the look back period only goes back to 2012. For municipalities like ours that has been sharing services long before that, we don't get any credit. This program is only in affect for two years.

The Village of Lansing decided at the October 6th meeting to ignore the Tax Freeze because they don't want to cut services. As reported by NYCOM, the average refund for Villages will be under \$10. Deferred maintenance would cost you even more in the long run. The Board, along with many other municipalities, doesn't think it is worth it to cut services just so some of our residents can get a small amount of money back in their pocket.
