COMMENTS FROM MAYOR DONALD HARTILL

This winter the Village Department of Public Works staff has again taken care of the snow removal from the Village streets. This winter has been a real winter compared to last year and we have used more than 1000 tons of salt which is more than normal. Our equipment has performed well and from the comments I hear from the public, our roadways have been well maintained.

John and his staff continue to enjoy the new garage facility and find it a great improvement to get into clean warm trucks to begin the snow plowing. Our new International truck has performed well and is much easier to drive than our old Sterling which will be sold at auction this summer.

The landscaping around the new Village Office was done last fall and hopefully all the plants have survived the cold winter. The new Village Office is working very well and the initial noise issues were resolved by moving the return for the heating and ventilation system from the hallway to behind the refrigerator in the kitchen. This broke up the resonant chamber that was formed by the hallway that was being driven by the air return.

We will be busy as soon as the weather warms and dries a bit repairing the usual winter damage to the roadways. Pot holes will continue to be patched as soon as we hear about them and more permanent repairs will be carried out as soon as the asphalt batch plants re-open in the spring. Crack sealing and shoulder repairs along with street sweeping and re-striping will be carried out as soon as weather permits. We will be repaving around one and one half miles of Village roadways this summer and fall. The other rite of spring is the annual brush pickup by the Village crew. The dates of the pickup and the guidelines appear later in the newsletter and I hope you will take advantage of this opportunity.

The replacement of the water main that runs under Route 13 is finished and is being connected into our system. By boring under the roadway, traffic was not affected. It was a combined project with Bolton Point that saved both organizations more than \$160,000 each. The storm water sewer along the south side of Dart Drive was finished last fall. The water main along Bush Lane will be replaced this year and the roadway will be repayed along with shoulder widening similar to what was done for Dart Drive. These projects are all part of our long-range infrastructure maintenance program. By carrying out these projects in

a planned way, we avoid the serious failures that are very expensive to repair when they occur.

A new traffic light will be installed at the intersection of North Triphammer Road and Craft Road this summer. This will relieve the stacking problem on Craft Road and will also help with regimenting southbound traffic on North Triphammer and make it much easier to get out of the Village driveway and Oakcrest Road. Part of the cost of the traffic light is being paid for with a generous grant from the Triad Foundation. Thank you.

We have completed the budget process for the coming fiscal year and have a proposed budget that will be presented at a public hearing scheduled for 7:35 pm on April 6th. The assessed value of the properties in the Village has increased by 1.2 % compared to last year. With the construction of the new Village Office our large capital construction projects are complete and we can look forward to steady-state funding. The proposed tax rate for this year is \$0.99 per thousand dollars assessment that yields a property tax levy that is 2 % above last year's. This is less than inflation for the items we have to buy so at some point we will have to make small increases in the tax rate to cover our expenses.

Over the years, the Village has systematically reduced its reliance on New York State financial aid so that budget issues in Albany have only minor effects on Village finances. Copies of the proposed budget are available as usual in the Village Office and it is posted on the Village website. The Village of Lansing continues to have one of the lowest tax rates in New York State for the services that we supply. Good fiscal management and out-sourcing as much of our needs as possible makes this all possible.

I would urge all residents who are interested to attend our Board meetings so that their input can be heard as the Boards go about their business.

Finally, Village elections for two Trustees and the Mayor will be held from noon to 9 pm on Tuesday April 28th at the new Village Office (2405 N. Triphammer Road). I encourage you to vote.

Budget Public Hearing

The Public Hearing on the proposed Village of Lansing Budget for Fiscal Year 2015-2016 will be Monday, April 6th at 7:35pm. Village residents attending the meeting have the right to provide written and oral comments. The aggregate salaries for the Board of Trustees are proposed in the amount of \$20,000, \$5,000 for each Trustee, and the salary for the Mayor is proposed in the amount of \$12,500. \$1,821,487 in appropriations is proposed for the General Fund. The proposed General Tax Rate is \$0.99 per \$1,000 of assessed value. A special assessment of \$.04 per \$1,000 of assessed value and \$9.24 per sewer unit is proposed for the Sewer Collector debt payment. Copies of the proposed budget may be inspected at the Village of Lansing Office during office hours: Monday -Thursday from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. The Budget can also be found on the Village Webpage.

PLANNING BOARD NEWS

The past six months have been slow for the Planning Board. I suppose we can blame it on the frozen weather. However, this did not hinder the progress of some previously approved projects, that you can see coming to conclusions i.e. Dairy One on Warren Road, the expansion of Bin-Optics on Brown Road, and the Gastroenterology/CMC building on the corner of Triphammer and Craft Roads.

The following are activities approved by the Planning Board that will have minor environmental impacts:

- Permit for a 140 s.f. addition to an existing garage at 109 Brook Drive. It will not impact the nearby stream.
- Change to Lansing Meadows PDA to give proper road frontage to BJ's Wholesale.
- Permit for a salt storage building on the Shops of Ithaca Mall lot behind the Ramada Inn, to be used on the Mall's parking lot during the winter snow season.
- Permit for a salt storage container in the east end of the Cayuga Mall parking lot.
- Permits for signs for two stores: D.S.W. shoe store at Shops on Ithaca Mall, and Advanced Auto Parts at Cayuga Mall.

The Village Comprehensive Plan update is nearing its final stages. I want to thank two Planning Board members, Lisa Schleelein and Deborah Dawson for their work in this important project. In conjunction with the Comprehensive Plan, the Planning Board is working on establishing a more specific Commercial Low Traffic District that will provide a buffer zone protecting the Village's residential areas that come near the higher traffic commercial areas. At the same time we will make it possible for commercial developers to bring in beneficial businesses.

This may be a good time to reintroduce everyone on the Planning Board. I am fortunate to have these fine people to work with: Phil Dankert, Maria Stycos, Lisa Schleelein, Deborah Dawson, and our Alternate, John Gillott. Their dedication is to make this Village a nice place to live, and work.

I cannot give enough accolades to our Code Enforcement Officer, Marty Moseley. He is a wealth of knowledge when it comes to the Village codes.

If you would like any additional information on any of the above topics please contact Marty Moseley at the Village Office. Once again, we welcome the Village public to attend our Planning Board meetings, which usually are held the second Monday and the last Tuesday of each month, at 7pm.

I would encourage individuals who are interested in, additions, new construction, remodeling, installation of a solid fuel burning heating appliance, chimney or flue, installation of new heating equipment, decks, pools, etc. to visit the Village of Lansing Office at 2405 North Triphammer Road for any questions they might have. On the Village website there is addition information and specifications for what is required for certain permits.

STORMWATER

Stormwater runoff is a main source of water pollution. Since stormwater runoff will eventually end up in Cayuga Lake, for this area, we ask the Village residents and business owners for help in decreasing the potential for pollutants. This is an important task since the Village and four other municipalities are provided drinking water from Cayuga Lake.

When stormwater flows to the drainage ways and drainage infrastructure, it picks up and mixes with what's there. That may include:

- Oil, grease, and automotive fluids
- Fertilizer and pesticides from gardens and homes
- Bacteria from pet waste and improperly maintained septic systems
- Soap from car washing
- Debris and litter

Many people assume that stormwater flows down storm drains and then to a treatment facility. That is almost never the case. It either flows directly into local waters or down storm drains, which channel it into local water bodies. By reducing or eliminating the above items the pollutants will not have the opportunity to enter into the Cayuga Lake, which will provide for many more years of enjoying and using the lake.

Brush Pick-Up

Spring brush and limb pick-up will be provided by the Town of Lansing Highway Departments on May 4th. Residents are asked to leave all materials near the roadside by 6:00 am Monday morning. To assist the work crews, all limbs and brush (up to 5 inches in diameter) should be piled with the cut ends facing the same direction. The limbs should be no longer than 6 feet in length. Also, the piles should not be tied, but should be left loose. Please do not put out bags of yard waste. This pick up is only for limbs and brush.

SOUTHERN CAYUGA LAKE INTERMUNICIPAL WATER COMMISSION

Bolton Point, Growth, Capital Projects, and 2015 Water Rate Increase

The 2015 Bolton Point component of your water rate is \$4.35/1000 gallons, an increase over 2014 of 6%. The Bolton Point component of water rates in the Bolton Point-Municipal Water System (BP-MWS) was increased from \$4.00/1000 gallons in 2014. The water and sewer surcharges will remain at 25%. This percentage is used to maintain the infrastructure in the Village.

Village of Lansing Residents will receive a bill quarterly at the beginning of January, April, July and October. All water/sewer bills are due by the 20th of that month and can be either mailed in or you may bring your payment to the Village Office at 2405 N. Triphammer Rd. If you would like to drop a payment off after hours there is a drop box inside the entry way to our new building. The Village of Lansing is part of the Southern Cayuga Lake Intermunicipal Water Commission (SCLIWC).

The Town of Ithaca, Town of Caroline, Village of Lansing, and the Village of Cayuga Heights have come together to form the Joint Youth Commission to oversee programs for middle school youth from these areas. DeWitt Middle School and Boynton Middle School have programs especially for youth in the Joint Commission area. Programs are free with a suggested donation of \$10-\$30 for programs that generally run nine weeks.

At Boynton, there are three after school programs for kids in the JYC area. Magic Mondays is for those who love games, especially the card game Magic: The Gathering. Tuesdays is a Global Cooking for kids interested in learning about healthy nutrition, and recipes from around the world. Wednesdays is a Girls Group for girls only to do an array of fun things from DIY spa days, dance parties, and fashion shows, to field trips to cool places around the area. Wednesdays at lunchtime there is also a group called Lego Lunches for kids who want to build with Legos and other mini-engineering feats.
