A BRIEF NOTE FROM THE MAYOR

In late January, a new traffic signal at the intersection of North Triphammer Road and Graham Road was placed in operation. This replaces the four way stop signs that have controlled traffic through this busy intersection for the past decade. A week later, a new traffic light that was installed at the intersection of Uptown Road, Arrowwood Road and Warren Road came into operation. We hope that these new lights will facilitate traffic movement through these important intersections.

In addition to these two new traffic lights, the four existing traffic lights along North Triphammer Road were replaced with new ones in early December. A new traffic light on Pyramid Drive was also added at the same time. These five lights are electronically coordinated and the one on the south end of the Route 13 overpass bridge has a dedicated left turn arrow for turning onto northbound Route 13. Traffic flow should be significantly improved with this system. New York State Department of Transportation has agreed to take over these five lights and be responsible for their maintenance. Previously, the two lights on the bridge were maintained by NSYDOT and the Village was responsible for the other two.

We hope that these improvements will make travel in the Village of Lansing a more enjoyable experience.

In other areas of our infrastructure, there has been steady progress on a regional solution to our wastewater treatment problem. Negotiations are making good progress to form a six-municipality partner- ship and the significant NY State funding already received should help make this regional solution a reality. To meet our immediate needs, the Village of Cayuga Heights agreed to issue us 14 new sewer unitswith 16 more expected due to our reduction of inflow and infiltration (I & I) into the

systems that feed their sewer treatment plant. There are further opportunities for I&I reduction and it is our expectation that more units can be obtained by this mechanism. This strategy should provide sufficient sewer units to satisfy our needs until the regional solution is in place.

Due to on-going construction at the YMCA, the playing fields will be unavailable for the children's T-ball program. In the meantime, the YMCA will be utilizing Dankert Park on Uptown Road on Saturdays (April 21-June 23) from 11:30-1:30 P.M.

Saving the best for last, I am extremely happy to announce a very generous gift from Audrey and Bill Edelman to the Village of Lansing. Late last year, they gave the undeveloped portion of the Kennsington Subdivision to the Village. Including the roadways, this is 16.2 acres which provides a great and unprecedented opportunity for the Village. During the coming months, I will be forming an ad hoc committee to recommend to the Board of Trustees how best to utilize the gift for the future enjoyment of Village residents.

Please remember to vote in the upcoming Village elections on April 24th.

PLANNING BOARD NEWS

The year 2000 was a very busy time for the Village of Lansing Planning Board. Some of the highlights were:

The month of October 2000 saw the move of McDonalds from its old location on the east side of N. Triphammer Road to its new upscale location across the road. The location of McDonalds was necessitated by the need for additional parking and restaurant space. The old McDonalds building reverted to the status of "low traffic". (It has always been located in a low-traffic zone but since it predated the establishment of the Village in 1974, it was "grandfathered" as a high-traffic establishment.) The old building has been renovated to serve as offices for a law firm.

In November 2000, Tops Friendly Markets opened a new store on the site of the old Howard Johnson's hotel. The opening of the new Tops revitalized an area which has become somewhat of an eyesore along N. Triphammer Road because of the vacant hotel. The Special Permit for the new Tops had been approved earlier in the year. In addition to the new facility which will also contain an Applebee's Restaurant and a series of other stores including a Blockbuster Video outlet. Tops, as part of their approval, was responsible for installing a new series of traffic lights along Pyramid Drive and N. Triphammer Road. These lights, which are coordinated, will do much to improve traffic along both roads.

In early 2001, the Planning Board after a long series of meetings, finalized the Special Permit for the Cornell Ornithology Lab, located in Sapsucker Woods. The new state-of-the-art facility of over

80,000 square feet of floor space, will be a world-class laboratory and training and research center, and will provide office and public exhibition space. The approval of the Lab itself, is located within the municipal boundary of the Village, while the majority of the new roadwork to the lab and all of the parking are located within the Town of Dryden.

The Planning Board also, by amendment to its previously approved Special Permit, approved Pyramid Mall going ahead with the construction of a Home Deport within the Mall. This Home Depot will be built as part of the approval granted Pyramid Mall in 1999 to expand by 150,000 square feet. The purpose of this amendment was to approve safety changes within the parking lot and the relocation of the Home Depot building.

During this period also, the Planning Board approved a Special Permit for a new branch of the Cornell Fingerlakes Credit Union on Sheraton Drive. Construction is scheduled to begin in early spring.

The Planning Board, composed of Chairman Ned Hickey, Planners Doris Brown, Steven Halevy, Carol Klepack, Janet Waterman and Alternate Phil Dankert, meet every second Monday and last Tuesday at the Village Office, 2405 N. Triphammer Road. All Village residents and other interested parties are urged to attend. Periodically, the Village has the need for Village residents to serve on "Ad Hoc" committees covering a variety of local subjects. Any interested Village resident is invited to contact the Village Office for more information.

N. TRIPHAMMER ROAD

PROJECT

As you may know, we have extensive plans to renovate and reconstruct North Triphammer Road from the north side of the bridge to Brook Drive. The change includes creating a turning lane in the center, with bike lanes, sidewalks, and green space on both sides. As part of our plans to manage traffic with the change in McDonalds and the addition to Tops, we replaced the 4-way stop at Graham Road with stoplights. While this was part of the N. Triphammer Road Reconstruction planning. Tops significant contribution allowed the installation much sooner.

So, when does all this start. We are in the process of building a team of people who will select the engineering firm who will oversee the project. This will be done by this summer. Construction will not start until the building season of 2002. However, given the size and scope of the project, we will make every attempt to ensure that one driving lane is open. Further, we will place signs at the site to forewarn drivers of any plans that will cause traffic delays. SOLID WASTE DIVISION

Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day

The next Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day will be from 8 AM - 2 PM on March 24^{th} at the D.E.P.O.T. (Don't Empty Pollutants in Our Trash), 122 Commercial Ave., Ithaca, next to the Recycling and Solid Waste Center.

The DEPOT will take Household Hazardous Waste from Tompkins County residents and homeowners and recycle or dispose of them properly. For example, paint (1/4 can or more), lawn chemicals, used oil, antifreeze, carpenter chemicals. etc.

You will need to make an appointment for March 24th collection day between the hours of 8 and 2. Fill out a registration form, which gives us an idea of what household hazardous waste you will be dropping off for proper recycling or disposal. The limit is no more than 25 gallons of liquid and 50 pounds of solids. You will also need a Tompkins County waste permit, which can be obtained at the Tompkins County Solid Waste Management Division office at the same address as above. You will need to bring your vehicle registration and there will be a charge of \$5.00 for the permit and the permit will be good for three years. For further information or to register through the mail, call 273-HHWM (4496). The Tompkins County Household Hazardous Waste collection program is partially funded with a grant from the NYS Dept. of Environmental Conservation.

Reused/Recycled Dry Cleaning Bags and Hangers

Several dry cleaning services and selected supermarkets in our area will accept clean plastic dry cleaning bags back for recycling. Bags should be free of paper tickets, tape, pins and staples. Local dry cleaners also accept wire clothes hangers in good condition. Hangers should be tied with string to prevent tangles. Call your dry cleaner to find our what is accepted.

A few of the local stores and dry cleaners that accept bags and hangers are:

- (1) Colonial Cleaners: 273-7121. They will accept bags. Bags need to be free of all paper, tape, pins and staples. Wire hangers must be tied together neatly. No rusty or bent hangers accepted.
- (2) Wyllie Dry Cleaners: 273-4500. They will accept bags. Bags need to be free of all paper, tape,

pins and staples. Wire hangers must be tied together neatly. No rusty or bent hangers accepted.

- (3) P & C Markets: Bags only. No tape, tickets or staples.
- (4) Wegmans: Bags only. No tape, tickets or staples.

Brush Pick-Up

The Public Works Department will be providing a spring brush and limb pick-up in the Village the week of April 30th.

Residents are asked to leave all materials near the roadside by 7:00 AM on *Monday* morning. To assist the work crews, all limbs and brush (up to five inches in diameter) should be piled with the cut ends facing the same direction. Also, the piles should not be tied but should be left loose. It also helps if thorny materials are separated from the rest. Each household is limited to approximately one pick-up size load. Excessive amounts will not be picked up and will become the responsibility of the homeowner to see they are removed. Leaves and trash bags will not be picked up.
