A SHORT NOTE FROM THE MAYOR

On April 7, 1997 after a Public Hearing and further discussion of the proposed 1997-98 Village budget, the Board of Trustees adopted the proposed budget as the official budget for the Village of Lansing for the 1997-98 fiscal year which begins June 1, 1997. The budget continues the process of addressing the needs of our roads, sidewalks, walkways, water system and sewer system which had been subjected to several years of deferred maintenance by our previous engineering consultants in the early 1990's. Highlights for this fiscal year are the resurfacing of Uptown Road and Cinema Drive, installation of a sidewalk along Sheraton Drive to connect with the existing sidewalks in that area, and the resurfacing of Twin Glens Road. We will begin the process of dismantling the elevated water tank at the airport and installing the piping to loop the system to provide improved fire flow capability for this important area of the Village. The storage system will consist of the existing ground tank at the airport and sharing part of the capacity of the Village Circle tank in the Town of Lansing by paying the Town for part of the capital cost and sharing the maintenance costs of the tank. This plan saves the Village about \$80,000 compared to repainting and refurbishing the elevated tank because of the lead based paint covering the elevated tank and simultaneously provides better water service.

We are making good progress on developing a Comprehensive Plan for the Village which will preserve all aspects of our current Zoning Ordinance and General Plan. We expect to have public hearings and a comment period during the summer before publishing the final version of the Comprehensive Plan for submission to the State.

I would like to remind our residents of the annual brush pickup in the Village the last week of April. In addition, the Village tree planting subsidy for residents will be available again this year to help beautify our streets and byways.

Finally, please vote during the Village Election on April 22. Residents who can not vote on that day because of Passover can vote at the County Board of Elections during business hours the entire week of April 14. The poles will be open from noon to 9:00 P.M. on the 22nd.

PLANNING BOARD NEWS

The Village of Lansing Planning Board, which usually meets the second Monday and last Tuesday of each month at 7:30 P.M. at the Lansing Village Office, 2405 N. Triphammer Road, held a total of 21 regular meetings during 1996. One additional meeting was devoted to our participation in a County sponsored workshop at the Holiday Inn in Ithaca.

Highlights of this work included:

Research for, discussions of, and the writing of a Lighting Plan for the Village of Lansing. We devoted parts of eight of our meetings to the subject. In addition, we held several sub-committee meetings which included the participation of NYSEG. This plan in its final form is now with the Board of Trustees for their consideration.

Plat approvals in accordance with the subdivision regulations of the Village of Lansing were made for, among others, Lansing Trails, Horizon Estates, Arrowwood Drive, Cayuga Hills, McLain subdivision, Brucato subdivision, and the Ellery subdivision. These approvals included the holding of Public Hearings.

Approval of Special Permits were made for, among others, Parkview Medical Center, M & T Bank, CBORD Group, Ithaca Peripherals, and Cayuga Medical Center's new Surgi-Center.

The Planning Board, over the course of several meetings, participated in lengthy discussions with the Southern Cayuga Lake Intermunicipal Water Commission (Bolton Point) on the upgrading of Bolton Point Road and the possibility of the Bolton Estate donating Poison Ivy Point (Bolton Point) to the Village which would be included in the 6% set aside, if and when the Bolton Estate land is developed. In this connection, the Planning Board worked closely with the Village Greenway Committee which retained a consultant to ascertain the feasibility of public uses for this land. These discussions are continuing.

The Planning Board held several ³Developer ¹s Conferences², including World Gym, Squeaky Clean Car Wash and Lansing Trails. The purpose of these conferences was to clarify matters for the developers prior to the submission of a formal application.

In addition, the Planning Board held a series of ³In-Service² training meetings, the purpose of which was to keep planning board members up-to-date on planning matters. The subjects of these meetings included: Historic Preservation, Construction Processes, Shared Senior Housing, Design of Municipal Street Lighting, Flag Lots, and the Functions of the Board of Zoning Appeals.

In conclusion, we would like to remind residents of the Village of Lansing that all Planning Board meetings start at 7:30 P.M. and that all are welcome to attend and participate.

Brush Pick-Up

The Town of Lansing will be providing brush and limb pick-up in the Village the week of April 28th.

Residents are asked to leave all materials near the roadside by 6:00 A.M. on Monday, April 28th. To assist the work crews, all limbs and brush (up to six inches in diameter) should be piled with the cut ends facing the same direction. Also the piles should not be tied but should be left loose. Each household is limited to approximately one pick-up size load. Proper disposal of large amounts from major brush clearing projects is through a tree service or landscaper. Leaves and trash in bags will not be picked up.

BOLTON POINT NEWS

Earth Day and Drinking Water Week

Spring brings thoughts of outdoors and our local ecology. These two spring celebrations help get us motivated to leave our ³cabins² after a long winter. On April 22, Earth Day will be celebrated. The staff at Bolton Point plans to participate in this day sactivities scheduled to occur on the Commons in the City of Ithaca. The public is encouraged to stop by the Bolton Point display and talk with our staff. We may be able to provide you with useful information or you can inform us of something of which we were not aware.

From May 4-10 Drinking Water Week will be celebrated. During this week the staff at Bolton Point plan to conduct guided tours of the treatment plant that will include a demonstration of our Distribution Department's role. Public tours will be held on Thursday, May 8 and Friday, May 9 beginning at noon. To join these tours just meet outside the treatment plant, located at 1402 East Shore Drive (Route 34) at 11:55 A.M. on either day.

Staff also plans to participate in a water taste contest sponsored by the Tompkins County Health Department. This event has been tentatively scheduled at the Commons in the City of Ithaca on Thursday, May 8 from 11:00 A.M. to 1:00 P.M. Please watch your local news for any schedule changes for this event. Representatives from the Health Department and the participating water systems will be on hand to distribute information on water and water treatment and to answer questions. Please contact the Bolton Point Production Department at 277-0660 with any questions about these two celebrations.

Fire Hydrants - Annual Flushing Program

Once a year Bolton Point staff flush water from several fire hydrants in the Village. This is done in order to ensure that fresh water is provided in all locations of the distribution main system.

Flushing is expected to start during the third week of July and it will take approximately four to five days to complete.

During flushing periods residents may see water bubbling up out of the ground or hydrants with running water.

If you see water running some place where you would not expect it or if you experience rusty water flowing in your home or place of business, please call the Bolton Point Distribution

Department at 277-0660 any time. During non-office hours an answering service will forward emergency calls to the appropriate personnel. Thank you for your cooperation.

NORTH TRIPHAMMER ROAD CORRIDOR RECONSTRUCTION COMMITTEE UPDATE

The North Triphammer Road Corridor Reconstruction Committee¹s (NTRCRC) work from 1996 concluded with a recommendation to the Board of Trustees that was unanimously endorsed. As the chair of the committee, I had the honor of defending our plan along with our Mayor and engineers with the New York State Department of Transportation. That resulted in our plan being accepted for funding consideration. If funding is confirmed and residents agree, the Village may radically change North Triphammer Road from the bridge to Brook Drive allowing for 3 driving lanes, bikeways, sidewalks, and stop lights. The strategy is to meet Village objectives including improving safety, while using external funding sources with an enhancement to the road instead of a repair (which is sorely needed).

If funding is approved, we will hold public informational meetings where businesses and residents can adjust the plan from a full-blown proposal to the size that makes the most sense.
